MEMBERS

ARTICLE 200 - The Active, Emeriti and Honorary Members of the Supreme Council accredited to each State; the Past First and Past Second Lieutenant Commanders of the Council of Deliberation; the Past Commanders-in-Chief of Consistories; the Past Most Wise Masters of Chapters of Rose Croix; the Past Sovereign Princes of Councils of Princes of Jerusalem; the Past Thrice Potent Masters of Lodges of Perfection; those members of Subordinate Bodies in the State who have received the Meritorious Service Award from the Council of Deliberation of such State, and the first three elected officers as well as the Treasurer and the Secretary of Subordinate Bodies, shall constitute a Council of Deliberation for that State of which the Deputy for that State shall be ex officio Illustrious Commander-in-Chief.

ARTICLE 329 - The first three officers as well as the Treasurer and the Secretary of each Subordinate Body shall be elected. All other officers shall be elected, or appointed by the presiding officer of the Body as the Rules and Regulations of the Body provide.

PROXIES

ARTICLE 201 - Any Officer of a Subordinate Body of the Rite who is entitled to a seat in the Council of Deliberation for his State, but is unable to be present at any session of such Council, may appoint as his proxy, to act in his stead, any member of such Subordinate Body, provided, however, that such proxy shall not represent more than one member of such Council.





ALLOCUTION OF THE ILLUSTRIOUS COMMANDER-IN-CHIEF

I warmly welcome you all to this One Hundred Twenty-eighth Annual Meeting of the Connecticut Council of Deliberation. As this is the first Council of Deliberation I've had the honor of chairing in my new capacity of Deputy for Connecticut, I extend my thanks to all of the Sublime Princes present today. I hope you enjoy our Annual Meeting, and leave here today with renewed enthusiasm for our great Rite.

I also extend a warm welcome to all of the other Distinguished Guests who have been able to join us today, and thank you also for your consideration in sharing this time with us. Your presence further illustrates the fulfillment of our Grand Masters motto for this year, "A Masonic Family, Working Together To Benefit All".

I had anticipated the opportunity to welcome once again our longtime friend and Honorary Member of this Council of Deliberation, Illustrious Brother Alfred J. Lobo, 33°, Deputy for the Orient of Connecticut, Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite of Freemasonry, United Supreme Council, Prince Hall Affiliation, Northern Jurisdiction, U.S.A., Inc. Unfortunately I received a phone call from him early this morning from Virginia, where pressing family business will prevent him from being able to join us for our session. He wants me to extend his regrets and best wishes for a productive meeting. I look forward to continuing the fine fraternal relationship nurtured by both him and Illustrious Brother Richard V. Travis, 33°, Active in Connecticut. May both of our Rites prosper and benefit from these associations.

I thank the officers and members of the Valley of Waterbury for being our hosts today. A special thanks goes out to Illustrious Brother Clyde Kayser, 33°, for accommodating my last minute request for a change of date from June 8th to June 15th. Thanks Clyde!

NECROLOGY

The passage of time is inexorable, and with that passage, change is inevitable. One of the saddest parts of change is loss. This year has had its passage and it losses. 140 Scottish Rite brothers have answered to the Heavenly Roll Call, and though gone from our physical sight, will remain in the hearts of those who loved and respected them.

Among those answering the Call from Above are 5 Honorary Members of this Supreme Council:

Illustrious Brother Sherman E. Eaton, MSA., 33°, from the Valley of Norwich. He received his MSA Award in 1964, and was coroneted an Honorary Member in 1968.

Illustrious Brother & Past Most Worshipful Grand Master, Merle P. Tapley, 33° from the Valley of Hartford. He was Thrice Potent Master 1964-1965, served the Grand Lodge of Connecticut as Most Worshipful Grand Master in 1971, and was coroneted an Honorary Member in 1972.

Illustrious Brother Lawrence P. Urban, 33°, from the Valley of New Haven. He was coroneted an Honorary Member in 1984 and served as Most Wise Master in 1986.

Illustrious Brother Herbert R. Olson, 33°, from the Valley of Hartford. He served as Thrice Potent Master 1985-1986, and was coroneted an Honorary Member in 1985.

Illustrious Brother and Dr. Matthew P. Campione, 33°, from the Valley of New Haven. He served Masonicare for many years on several Boards, and was coroneted in 1995.

We are also saddened by the loss of 2 other holders of the Arthur M. Brown, 33°, Meritorious Service Award beside Illustrious Brother Eaton. They are:

Sublime Prince Clinton E. Driscoll, MSA, from the Valley of Hartford, who received his MSA Award in 1991.

Sublime Prince Alton D. Nankervis, M.S.A, from the Valley of Bridgeport, who served as Most Wise Master in 1968 and received his MSA Award in 1972.

Our ranks were further diminished by the loss of:

Sublime Prince Sigmund E. Kei, 32°, from the Valley of Hartford, who served as Sovereign Prince in 1971-1972.

I quote a familiar verse: "At such a time as this-I never gaze on some well loved face but what I think, one more to welcome me, when I shall cross the intervening space between this land and that one over there, one more to make the strange beyond seem fair". Well done good and faithful servants!

I now call on Illustrious Brother Burton Turner, 33° , for a prayer honoring these departed brothers.

STATE OF THE RITE

As the new Deputy for Connecticut, I and the other Active and Emeriti Members have been cordially received in all of our visits to the Valleys and Consistories of Connecticut. There appears to be a new feeling of enthusiasm within Connecticut Scottish Rite, and this is a very heartwarming feeling. The degree work witnessed was generally of good to excellent quality. In the few instances where the work needed improvement, assurances were given that it would be addressed. New costumes were in evidence in some of the degrees, and from Executive Meeting notes, I see that plans are underway to continue replacing older costumes. As with all "productions", the behind the scenes support is as important as the on stage performers. In addition to recruiting new Ritualists to bolster the pool of performers, an active drive must be made in each Valley to add, hopefully some of our newer members, to join in our "work".

For the first time, in recent memory at least, a "new" degree was conferred. Connecticut Consistory conferred the non-singing ritual for the 22nd degree, Prince of Libanus. It was well received, and should be considered as an alternative for those Consistories that are unable to field a singing cast. The Valley of Hartford/Nathan Hale Consistory presented the former 26th degree, the Lincoln Degree, in a public candidate **INDEX**

Information night, and it was also favorable received. Finally, the 30th degree, Grand Inspector, was conferred for the first time in 6 years by Lafayette Consistory with a Valley of New Haven cast.

However, all of this effort is for naught if two other very important elements aren't addressed. One is a lack of existing members on the sidelines. Brothers, we have 3800 Scottish Rite members in Connecticut, and if we counted up all of the side liners who've attended this years meetings, I seriously doubt if we had 5% attendance. The other is the size of our classes of candidates in the recent past. Sublime Princes, we're only introducing the Scottish Rite to about 30% of our Masonic brothers! While I don't advocate stripping our Blue Lodges of their members, we really aren't doing a good job of encouraging enough of them to seek additional light in the Scottish Rite. Because of this, and other circumstances, a couple of our Valleys are rapidly approaching a critical membership number which will force us to make changes in the Valley structure in Connecticut. I certainly don't want to see this happen, because we have the advantage of having Valleys geographically located as to be easily accessible by most of our Connecticut brothers, and officers capable of conferring meaningful degrees. We must give priority to each of these issues, and in doing so, I think we'll find that by increasing the sidelines, the members will be more enthusiastic about finding new candidates. Conversely, when the candidates see a good showing on the side lines, they'll encourage others to join in our good work.

CHILDRENS LEARNING CENTER

The Children's Learning Center in Waterbury is straining at the seams with at one period 30 students enrolled. They had a Ceremony of Achievement on May 22^{nd} when 9 students "graduated." As always, it was a very moving experience for those involved, and is a vivid demonstration of what these young people can accomplish under the one-on-one tutoring of the Orton-Gillingham Method. A very dramatic representation of the benefits our generous contributions make possible.

You will hear first hand reports from our Learning Center Director, Mrs. Cheryl Sharkis, and Ill. David Sharkis, Associate Member of the Board of Governors, shortly.

CONCLUSION

Brothers, throughout my allocution, you've heard me allude to members. New members and older members, both in age and in years of service to our Rite. The cold hard facts are that without a resurgence of our existing membership as well as an influx of new candidates, Connecticut faces a crisis situation, not in the near future, but right now!

I've formed a new Website Committee to implement a functioning, informational and effective website in the hopes of attracting candidates, and it will be developed under www.ctscottishrite.org. Each Valley will have it's own link, as

as well as links to other areas of interest, such as our Learning Center and National Heritage Museum.

We already have in place Membership and Retention, and Long Range and Strategic Planning Committees, but they are of no value unless WE, the core members of CT Scottish Rite take the initiative and personally invite a Masonic brother to join us in Scottish Rite. We also need to understand that with that invitation to join comes a commitment on our part to mentor that new brother, make him feel welcome and an important part of what we do. Bringing in candidates by being the top line signer is wonderful, but if we don't make him feel welcome after each degree, and personally invite him to all of our meetings and events, we'll lose him within a couple of years at most. We have a huge responsibility facing us and only be meeting it head-on can we survive. My brothers, the future of Scottish Rite in Connecticut is in your hands!

REPORT OF THE ACTIVE

To the Illustrious Commander-in-Chief, Officers and Brethren on the Connecticut Council of Deliberation in Session at Torrington, Connecticut on June 15, 2007:

We continue to be fortunate in Connecticut in that we have many good ritualists in our beloved Scottish Rite, so that even with our reduced membership, we continue to be able to confer the degrees in our respective Valleys with help from our sister Valleys. However, as the membership continues to decline and our ranks continue to thin we must face the reality of Valleys joining together to confer the work. It is imperative that we encourage our new members as well as our dormant brothers to take an active part, no matter how small, in the work, so that they can replace our active brothers as they retire from participation.

One area of continuing concern that I have noticed when visiting the Valleys, is the exceptionally low attendance of the members, and the absence of the Officers of the Bodies seated in the Valley. All Officers should be present for all meetings in their respective Valleys. Officers, your presence or absence is noticed by the candidates, and members on the sidelines. We must be able to impress our candidates with the best presentation possible in order to encourage them to become viable and active members. This includes membership support in the audience in conjunction with good degree work.

My Brothers, Masonry continues to suffer from too few doing too much. If we are to survive in the 21st century we must increase the participation of our members in our members in our Blue Lodges and Scottish Rite bodies, otherwise we are doomed to become just a dysfunctional group with no direction or purpose.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON SCHOLARSHIPS

To the Illustrious Commander-in-Chief, Officers and Brethren on the Connecticut Council of Deliberation in Session at Torrington, Connecticut on June 15, 2007:

This year, The Supreme Council, located in Lexington, Massachusetts has awarded \$18,000.00 to Connecticut for Abbott Scholarships. The State Scholarship Committee of the Connecticut Council of Deliberation has recommended 18 applicants to become 2007 Abbott Scholarship recipients. These recommendations were made to Illustrious James R. Spencer, Jr., MSA, 33°, Deputy of Connecticut and to the Supreme Council.

Leon M. Abbott Scholarships provide financial support for the continuing education of young men and women from Scottish Rite families and Masonic-related youth programs. Since 1951, more that \$3 million has been awarded to students from each state of the Northern Masonic Jurisdiction.

Eligibility: The following criteria are used to determine the eligibility of applicants for the program:

- A currently enrolled sophomore, junior of senior at an accredited college or university.
- A minimum grade point average of 2.75 on a 4.0 scale.
- A child or grandchild of a Scottish Rite Mason in the Northern Masonic Jurisdiction.
- A member of a youth organization sponsored by the Masonic fraternity in the Northern Masonic Jurisdiction.
- A graduate of one of the 32° Masonic Learning Centers of Children in the Northern Masonic Jurisdiction.

The State Scholarship Committee received a total of 34 applications from all five Valleys in Connecticut. The 18 recipients of this year's scholarships demonstrated excellent scholarship and genuine financial need. Impressive letters of recommendations from teachers, professors and high school counselors supported all applications. Recipients also exhibited extensive volunteer community service, broad extracurricular activities, leadership and honors/awards in sports, music and drama. Some are holding part-time jobs during the school calendar year and full-time summer employment to help pay for college costs.

This year, all five Valleys in Connecticut have given their own College Scholarships to applicants. The Valley of Bridgeport has given four scholarships, the Valley of Hartford has given nine scholarships, the Valley of New Haven has given four scholarships, the Valley of Norwich has given one scholarship and the Valley of Waterbury has given two scholarships.

REPORT OF THE MEMBERSHIP & RETENTION COMMITTEE FOR THE STATE OF CONNECTICUT

To the Illustrious Commander-in-Chief, Officers and Brethren on the Connecticut Council of Deliberation in Session at Torrington, Connecticut on June 15, 2007:

The Chairman of the State Membership and Retention Committee respectfully submits the following Report for the year 2006 – 2007

As each valley has submitted an individual report for publication, I would like to give a synopsis of their collective efforts.

MEMBERSHIP

- 1.On going dialogues with blue lodges in respective districts. Part of this dialogue involves visitation to lodge meetings and being the program for the evening. Helping our blue lodges any way we can. Included in this help are the underwriting of mailings for any blue lodge and plans for a Scottish Rite Degree team which will perform the allegorical portion of the 3rd degree for any lodge upon request.
- 2. Inclusion of non Scottish Rite Mason's and non mason's in Scottish Rite Family life events.
- 3. Open degree nights where potential prospects and their wives, significant others and their children are invited to witness a public degree and get information on the benefits of belonging to the Scottish Rite
- 4. Sending complimentary copies of the valley newsletter to all Master Mason's in a valley's district.
- 5. Actively participating in Fair booths to raise money for Scottish Rite causes and publicly indicating where the money is going and providing literature on both the Scottish Rite and the Blue Lodge.
- 6. Encouraging our members to bring in new brothers by establishing or continue to support a black hat program which awards a black hat to any Sublime Prince who has brought in a certain number of candidates.

Each Valley has a different style of what they will do to encourage membership. Some of the above work for one valley but just don't give the same results for another. It would, however be to our detriment if all methods used by all the valleys were not listed and available for a sister valley to use or try out.

RETENTION

I was once told that the biggest issue in becoming the best or achieving a goal was not the work getting there but the enormous work of staying there. It is truly a situation where the adages "use it or lose it" is the operative command. In the Scottish Rite we have the wonderful attainment of making new Sublime Princes but if they are not used, we do lose them and in our current situation, we cannot afford to lose anyone.

Each Valley is struggling with the loss of brothers to death; non payment of dues and request for demits. In all cases, efforts are made to personally contact NPD's and demit requestors to see what the reasoning is. All valleys have established a means of determining whether or not to remit dues on a brother's behalf. If a brother has a non financial reason for NPD or a demit request, all valley's have established a program to investigate the reason and see if the brother can be encouraged to return. One of the best regulations we have is that no brother can be dropped from our rolls unless personal contact has been made. This regulation requires that we communicate with our brothers, to see what caused their decision

- 1. Obviously the above struggle is more akin to shutting the barn door after the horse has escaped. On a more proactive note, the synopsis of the valleys to ensure retention is as follows:
- 2. Encouraging newly created Sublime Princes to join a cast or crew for a particular degree or to consider an appointment as an officer in our valley lines
- 3. Holding special dinners for newly created Sublime Princes or inviting newly created Sublime Princes to Worker's night dinners.
- 4. Open Installation evenings with dinners for both the Sublime Prince and his guest.
- 5. Offering free dinners and social hours around the degrees

You might have noticed that the list for retention is slightly smaller than my list for Membership. Honestly, it should be twice as large. As I indicated, it is more difficult to stay on the hill once the goal has been attained.

My charge to the brethren is to find ways to improve our retention list.

We need to find ways of including as many new brother's in our activities as possible. It is use them or lose them folks. To have a class of 20 and then retain only one or two actively working in a valley is not just criminal stupidity, it is the very thing we fear the most. It will guarantee the loss of our valley's and consistories. We have the ability to involve every new brother in something. We just need to ask them. Not wait for them to ask us.

We need to start devoting our efforts to include significant others and children in our social activities. We also need to branch out and see how far we can push our boundaries to ensure that significant others encourage prospective brethren to join us. If we can generate the interest and the enthusiasm, growth will naturally follow. It is time to go on the offensive and show everyone what it means to belong to our beloved fraternity, its good works and it's goals. It is time to ensure that all new Sublime Princes are spoken to and asked to become a part of the Scottish Rite works, not just a number on our rolls.

REPORT OF THE MEMBERSHIP COMMITTEE VALLEY OF NEW HAVEN

Membership Development: The Valley of New Haven had 8 members in the Fall Class of 2006 and 6 members in the Spring Class of 2007. Far short of our goal of 20 new members in each class.

MEMBERSHIP

We remain committed to make ourselves available to the Masters and Wardens of the Blue Lodges in the 4th District to bring our Scottish Rite message to their Lodges. This would enable them to plan a special program sometime during their year for their members and would give us the opportunity to sell our product. However, we have only been invited to speak at one Blue Lodge this past year. It seems that the Lodges still have the old fear that we would be trying to "Steal" their members.

Our Valley held a **prospect presentation** in September of 2006 and we are scheduling another presentation on Monday August 20, 2007 for our Fall Class. We have had great success signing up the prospects who attend our presentations, but we have not been getting large numbers of potential candidates to come out.

Our **Family Programs**, under the direction of Illustrious Jack Stevens, presented a family picnic in July, a dinner theatre in September, and a family picnic in February. He says that the Valley will again sponsor a picnic on Saturday July 21 and a dinner theatre on Saturday September 29th with a play called "A night with Abe" at the **INDEX**

New Haven Temple. It is hoped that many of our members will invite potential candidates and their families to all of our activities. Jack's committee also sponsored a bus trip to Lexington Mass in May of this year. We are holding our Installations each year at Ashlar Village and have been inviting our families to attend. All these programs are planned for our members to invite non-Masons as well as Masons who are not yet Scottish Rite members.

Our Valley must bring in new members to offset our losses, therefore each member of the valley must be actively recruiting new members for the Scottish Rite from their Blue Lodges.

Membership Retention

Each one of us joined the Scottish Rite for a reason. Each candidate must feel that they are wanted and needed as an active member of the Valley after their "Class" has "graduated". This is accomplished by inviting them to participate as a member of the Cast, Choir, Stage Crew, Make-up team, or just to come and watch degrees that they have not yet seen.

We sponsor a dinner before each degree with a social hour after. This helps our candidates get acquainted with other members of the Valley.

After deaths, our biggest loss is NPDs. We may not be able to do anything about the deaths but we should be able to eliminate or at least decrease the number of NPDs. Our Valley Retention Committee, which consists of the top three Officers of each body, are charged with contacting delinquent members personally to find out if they need assistance. Some of our members, however, are too proud to let us know that they cannot afford to pay their dues. Many of our elderly members cannot drive at night and feel the necessity to "drop out". We stand ready to assist those members who are unable or reluctant to pay their dues, but would like to remain a member of the Scottish Rite. We should not drop a member simply because he cannot afford to pay his dues. If he wants to remain a member, we will find a way to keep him as a member.

Membership Development and Membership Retention is the life of our beloved Scottish Rite. It is up to each one of us!! We can do it!! We must do it!!

REPORT OF THE MEMBERSHIP & RETENTION COMMITTEES VALLEY OF NORWICH

To the Illustrious Commander-in-Chief, Officers and Brethren on the Connecticut Council of Deliberation in Session at Torrington, Connecticut on June 15, 2007:

The Valley of Norwich continues to overcome the effects of an aging membership and the certainty of life. We continue to keep the number of demits and suspensions to a minimum.

Death continues to overtake us and is inevitable. Again this year we have lost Brothers, some of which were very active in the Valley. Our loss is deep and our memories long. Some Blue Lodge Brothers in attendance expressed an interest in the

Rite because of the ceremony.

The best memorial to a lost active Brother is the work we do to keep our Valley as positive contributing force within our fraternity and community. In addition to our continued work to meet the goals and objectives of the long-range plan, we are working to rekindle the fires in our inactive members. We continue to put the new members to work in various positions, either cast members stagehands or the officer line of the various bodies. In some cases we are using them in more than one position.

The Valley has instituted a new membership program "The Black Cap" to recognize Brothers who have brought in 5 new members in 2 classes and we are proud to have three brothers receive this award for the last two classes.

Even though we are continuingly losing Brothers to the Grand Architect of the Universe we are proud to have brought in 22 new members in the last year.

The professional printing and mailing services we provide continues to be utilized by the Lodges in New London and Windham Counties and supporting the North Stonington fair food both has brought us out to the community. We have seen an increased interest in the Scottish Rite in recent months. What specifically this increased interest can be attributed to is unsure at this time, but we continue to pursue new members in every way we are able.

RETENTION

We have been blessed to have a 9 member increase in our Lodge of Perfection this year. We have continued to focus on our brothers who through hardship or age have been reluctant to continue in the Scottish Rite Valley of Norwich. Through attention to the unsaid messages sent by our brothers and dues abatements where indicated, we have again reduced the requests for demits and suspensions for non-payment of dues. Retention results from caring and communication and we are striving to improve both of these areas.

We have improved our communications by the utilization of e-mail for those that would prefer it. This increases the timeliness of the information being received by the brothers. At the same time, we have actively engaged and challenged our newly created 32nds to take part in our degrees in any way they have an interest. As a result, we have been able to continue to portray new degrees in our valley and include new willing participants in our work.

We are continuing to request the assistance of the members in the support of our scholarship programs, both local and Abbott.

All these activities, coupled with the Supreme Council programs of Children's Learning Centers, The Northern Light Magazine, Abbott Scholarships and the Museum of Our National Heritage, provide that extra reason to sustain membership and to think about the positive effects that paying dues provides.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE STATE OF THE RITE

To the Illustrious Commander-in-Chief, Officers and Brethren on the Connecticut Council of Deliberation in Session at Torrington, Connecticut on June 15, 2007:

A comprehensive impression of the State of the Rite can be obtained by reviewing the Allocution of the Illustrious Commander-in-Chief, the Report of the Active, the reports of the various Council of Deliberation committees and those from each of the five valleys. Although detailed information was not reported by all the valleys, the following summary has been extracted from Commanders-in Chief of Lafayette Consistory, Nathan Hale Consistory and Connecticut Consistory, respectively.

Supreme Council

Illustrious Brothers Gustaf R. Bodin; Joseph B. Cyr, MSA; Jack H. Stevens, MSA, and Howard D. Turner, MSA were coroneted Sovereign Grand Inspectors General on August 29, 2006 at the Annual Session of the Supreme Council in Chicago. **INDEX**

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The following Brothers have been elected to receive this degree at this year's annual session in Washington, D.C. in August: David R. Blythe, Sr.; Arthur H Carlstrom, MSA; Sidney W. Isenburg; Richard R. Jones. Jr., and Stephen P. Schreck.

Degree Work

Collectively, the following degrees were exemplified within the Council's jurisdiction during the past year: 4, 5, 7, 8, 10, 12, 14, 15, 16, 18, 19, 21, 22, 27, 30, 31, and 32 degrees. While most degrees were exemplified by casts made up exclusively of members of one valley, in some cases, degrees were portrayed by composite casts from two to four valleys. In addition, the Valleys of New Haven and Waterbury portrayed the Feast of the Paschal Lamb in New Haven. It has been proposed that this solemn ceremonial be presented every third year alternating casts from the two valleys.

Valley Activities

The Valley of Bridgeport donates its Stratford Theatre for use by the Town of Stratford for such agencies as the Stratford Community Services, Sterling House Community Center, Stratford Arts Commission and the Stratford Public School for youth activities. The Valley, in concert with the Valleys of New Haven and Waterbury, also continues to sponsor an Award's Program which recognizes individuals for volunteer community service and heroism which are drawn from the jurisdiction of Lafayette Consistory. The Valley of Bridgeport is the major sponsor of Character Education in the Stratford Public Schools; a cosponsor of the Masonic Run for Hope, Love and Charity "Turkey Trot" on Thanksgiving morning; and a major sponsor of the Winter Concert of the Greater Bridgeport Youth Symphony Orchestra. The Valley also participates in the Annual Stratford Day activities.

The Valley of Hartford supports its youth with financial aid to deserving students who have met the requirements of the Scholarship committee. The Valley of Hartford has also initiated dinners for the newly made 32nd Degree Masons and their ladies. This dinner has been a very successful tool to reinforce Scottish Rite Masonry as a family oriented organization.

The Valley of New Haven has developed a very strong Family Life Program which included a picnic at Ashlar Village in July, a dinner theatre in September, and a bus excursion to Lexington, MA, including a tour of the museum and an excellent lunch. The Valley supports college students with scholarships who have Masonic affiliations and are in need of financial assistance. They also support the Children's Learning Center with financial contributions.

The Valley of Norwich has contributed substantially to the Preston Food Bank and St. Vincent DePaul Place in Norwich. The Valley also supports the 8th Masonic District's Widows Fund. The Valley also provides monetary support to the CT CHIP as well as volunteers for CHIP events held within the 8th Masonic District.

The Family Life program included attending the home opener of the *Connecticut Sun*, professional women's basketball team. In addition, attendees were treated to a "behind the scenes" tour of their facilities.

The Valley of Waterbury's Family Life Program included the 9th Annual New Britain Rock Cats Picnic and Baseball Game in August and the Walk for Dyslexia for the Children's Learning Center in October. Many of the Valley members participate in local neighborhood associations. The Valley sponsors a CT CHIP at the Waterbury Masonic Temple on the day of the walk.

Membership

We are beginning to grow our membership in some of the Valleys. The key is to involve new members in active participation as quickly as possible. The results of such efforts have been positive.

Conclusions

It is time to stop wringing our hands about membership loss and do something positive to build our Craft. Good degree work, welcoming new members and their families, sharing our brotherhood and belief in the Almighty Father of the Universe should be our primary objectives. By stimulating the Blue Lodge members in our district to seek new light in Masonry we can encourage them to join us in Scottish Rite.

Comments from Strategic Planning Committee

In June 2004, your Council, in concert with the NMJ, adopted a strategic plan based on eight fundamental goals. These goals are:

- •Be proactive to attract, engage and retain Brethren
- •Build closer working relationships with Grand Lodge, each
- •Symbolic Lodge and other Masonic Based organizations
- •Be an organization managed effectively Be led by men with leadership skills
 - •Be recognized as a fraternal organization committed to philanthropy and community service
 - •Be active in the community at large
 - •Be endorsed by the entire family
 - •Be financially strong to accomplish the long-range mission
 - •To achieve these goals the Committee identified various objectives.

Using the Council's plan as their strategic roadmap, the Valley's were charged with developing their own corresponding plans and the action steps necessary to accomplish the eight goals and underlying objectives.

For the past two years the committee has made minor changes to the plan and also assisted the Valleys with their strategic plans. This year the NMJ updated their strategic plan thus prompting the Committee to undertake a fresh review of the Council plan. To this end the committee consulted with Ill. Brother James R. Spencer, Jr., 33°, reviewed the Allocution of Ill. Bro. Richard V. Travis, 33°, and the reports submitted by the Membership Committee, State of the Rite Committee and the Long-range Planning Committee at the 127th Session of the Council.

The NMJ and Council strategic plans continue to focus on priorities of image building, membership, communication, cooperation, charitable endeavors and financial strength.

The following modifications are recommended to the Council's plan as previously adopted on June 9, 2006:

To add an additional objective to the goal –

"Be proactive to attract, engage and retain Brethren"

"Increase youth awareness and interest in the fraternity." This

change reflects the desire to broaden our demographic base.

Tangentially, Valleys may need to add or modify action items in the areas of retention and Family Life activities.

To modify an existing objective to the goal -

"Be an organization managed effectively"

"Expand the use of communications via internet to facilitate dissemination of information." This change eliminates the wording "in cooperation with Grand Lodge."

To delete and add objectives to the goal -

"Be led by men with leadership skills"

Delete the objective "Officers of each body become familiar with the officers manual." This objective is an appropriate action item at the item at the Valley level.

Add the objective "Promote leadership opportunities within the Valleys."

Leaders will gravitate to leadership positions if opportunities to lead exist. In developing an action plan, Valleys should evaluate the current process used to identify and appoint/elect leaders and ask; do we attract and retain the best possible candidates for leadership roles? If the answer is no or we're not sure, the Valley needs to develop action steps to address those answers.

Add the objective "Engage new Scottish Rite masons in Valley committees and activities." To paraphrase the song by Pete Seeger, "Where have all the newly raised brothers gone?" is the focus of this objective. Although there is some levity in the comment, the point is quite serious. Valley's need to develop action plans to preempt member fade-away due to disinterest. Keeping these brothers involved creates a larger pool of potential leaders to draw from.

To modify an existing objective to the goal – "Be recognized as a fraternal organization committed to philanthropy and community service"

Add specific reference of the 32° Masonic Learning Centers for Children, National Heritage Museum, Abbott Scholarships and Schizophrenia Research Fellowships.

To modify the existing strategy "Be attractive in the community at large" to "Be active in the community at large"

Valley Strategic Planning

All of the Valleys continue to focus their efforts on membership development, retention and participation. To that end, the Valleys have focused efforts on reaching out to the lodges in their Valley to discuss Scottish Rite masonry, developing strategies to engage candidates and new members in Valley activities, maintaining quality of degree work while working to attain the goal of presenting all 29 degrees, improving member communications and developing family focused activities.

Bridgeport is continuing work on their Ambassador program to reach out to lodges in their Valley, expanding recruitment mailings to increase class sizes and continuation of the candidate orientation program. To increase public awareness of Scottish Rite, the Valley is continuing with their Annual Awards program for outstanding volunteer work and heroism. To increase activities with lodges, the Valley has presented the $20^{\rm th}$ degree and has developed a Colonial degree team to present the E.A. degree.

Hartford is continuing their efforts to engage new candidates in Valley activities with candidate orientation dinners and presentation of a public degree during candidate information night. The executive committee is focusing on officer line management and training issues and recently completed a rewrite of the officer's manual. To improve member communication, the Secretary and line officers are continuing to expand the use of email and a Hartford Valley website was created.

New Haven is continuing their efforts to attract and retain members through candidate nights, prospect parties and information programs. The Valley is continuing efforts to update their facilities. To increase awareness of the Valley the public installation of officers will continue at Ashlar Village and a dinner theater presentation "An evening with Abe" is planned for the fall.

Norwich is continuing their efforts to attract and retain members and have added a Scottish Rite Blue Lodge nights for dinner and conversation, engaging brothers not currently serving as line officers in other committee activities and degree presentations, continuing to involve family members in Valley family life activities, and to continue to promote Scottish Rite to the community at large.

Waterbury is continuing to spread the word of Scottish Rite activities during informational presentations at lodges in their Valley, to promote the Learning Center located in Waterbury, continuing efforts to improve management of costumes, props and facilities, improve leadership with an update of the officers manual and continuation of Family Life activities including continuation of the Rockcat's baseball outing.

Summary

A strategic plan is a tool for individuals in leadership roles to utilize for furtherance of the organization and its mission. The Council can guide or act as a catalyst but in the end those individuals in leadership roles within each Valley must embrace both the Council plan and their Valley plan. This requires setting action steps in order to accomplish those objectives that are appropriate for their Valley. It also requires periodic review of the plan and fine tuning as necessary due to changing needs of the Valley. We thank the executive committees of each Valley for supporting this effort.

As mentioned in prior reports of this Committee, we recommend a continuing priority of efforts during the current year. These include:

Continued efforts to work collaboratively with our Grand Lodge and local Blue Lodges to increase Masonry in Connecticut

Membership development which includes new candidate solicitation and retention.

Continued efforts to expand the public's awareness of Scottish Rite Masonry in Connecticut.

Continued efforts to improve communication with our brothers by any means, including completion of the Connecticut Scottish Rite website.

Uniform leadership training provided to all Valleys. Continued support of the Scottish Rite Learning Centers for Children.

The Committee would like to thank our Illustrious Commander-in-Chief, Officers and Brethren on the Connecticut Council of Deliberation for giving us the opportunity to participate in this very important process.

REPORT OF THE 32° MASONIC LEARNING CENTER FOR CHILDREN

To the Illustrious Commander-in-Chief, Officers and Brethren on the Connecticut Council of Deliberation in Session at Torrington, CT on June 15, 2007:

As Co-Chairmen of the Learning Center Committee, I am honored to report on the status of the Valley of Waterbury 32° Masonic Learning Center for Children. Once again, our Center, evidenced by the progress of our students, has had an exceptional year. I refer you to our Center Director's report for specifics relative to our academic programs. This report will focus on the tactical operations of the Center and the more long-term strategic issues.

First let me address tactical operations. As reported last year, the day-to-day operation of the Learning Center is no different than operating any small business. With 11 part-time employees and up to 30 students, each day our staff is faced with a variety of facility, personnel, and client issues. Additionally, our staff is ever vigilant to ensure our academic instruction is fully compliant with the corporate directives that are necessary to insure that we maintain our IMSLEC accreditation. This is no easy task. Our staff puts in many hours, often uncompensated, to insure your Center provides the very best instruction within the guidelines that are set forth by Lexington. We, the membership of the Ancient Accepted Scottish Rite of Connecticut, owe them our deepest gratitude for their hard work and selfless dedication to the youngsters entrusted to their care. I can unequivocally state that due to the efforts of our dedicated staff, we can rest assured that our Center will continue to establish itself as a Center of Excellence.

Now I'd like to address our strategic issues. Last year, I openly asked you, the Ancient Accepted Scottish Rite of Connecticut, to step forward and consider what it would take to open a second Learning Center. We continue to get outstanding financial support from our membership, especially from our Valley treasuries. In fact, we can take pride in that the Waterbury Center ranked first among the 58 Centers in participation in the Sponsor-a-Child Program in 2006. However, it takes much more than financial support to open and operate a Center. As I stated earlier, our core staff is consumed with the tactical operations of the Center. This is, and should be, their priority. It then becomes the sole responsibility of the Board of Governors to oversee the operation of the Center; to provide good council to the Center director and staff, to interface with Lexington and to organize and execute fundraising initiatives. The Waterbury Center's Board continues to be extremely understaffed, so much so that a legal quorum is almost never present at the meetings. The effect of this lack of support is beginning to show. It shows in the decline of non-masonic financial support. Most recently it was evidenced by our absence at Grand Master's Day. Based upon our inability to effectively staff our Board, I now have mixed emotions over our lack of progress in expanding our program. If, from within our ranks we can not find the necessary talent to support a single Center, perhaps we have no right to seek a second.

So this year I will not ask for your support in opening additional Centers. I will not tug at your hearts and emotions with a video of our student's accomplishments. Instead, I'll conclude this year's report with a much simpler set of questions for you to reflect upon. Brothers, what is your pleasure? Are you satisfied with our single Center?

Are you satisfied with watching our enrollment decrease ever so slightly, from year to year as we fight to balance our budget? Is it acceptable to you that the Center no longer seeks opportunities to market itself throughout our local communities for fear of giving children and their parents false hope? Are you unable to give of your time and abilities to help the Waterbury Center operate at peak performance and attendance levels? It is this Brother's opinion that you owe it to our Learning Center staff to make your intentions known. They continue to work hard and to train hard so that they will be ready when called upon to assist you in growing our program. If your answers to my questions are in the affirmative, I will work with our staff to re-evaluate their development and expectations. However, if you are not happy with the scenario I describe, I ask you to seriously consider how you can help. I look around this room and I see a breadth of talent before me. Evaluate you talents and abilities against the needs of our Board. If there is a match, step forward and fill out an application. If you are unable to serve as a member of the Board, ask our Board chairperson how you can help.

I understand we need to make reversing the trend of declining membership our priority. In today's hectic, technically complex world, making true progress against any initiative seldom involves a straight and simple path. To make progress, we need to attack and fight multiple fronts as there are no simple solutions. For a minute, envision the ever-popular rock climbing walls we see at local fairs and carnivals. The successful climber never takes a direct route. They move laterally, side-to-side; making progress on all fronts, while moving upward toward the goal of reaching the summit. Each one of us should embrace the goal of making our beloved Scottish Rite a vibrant, growing organization. Let us work together to grow our membership, but at the same time, lets make sure we continue to move side-to-side and give of ourselves to the philanthropies we support.

REPORT OF THE DIRECTOR OF THE 32° MASONIC LEARNING CENTER FOR CHILDREN

To the Illustrious Commander-in-Chief, Officers and Brethren on the Connecticut Council of Deliberation in Session at Torrington, CT on June 15, 2007:

Good afternoon and greetings from all of us at the Valley of Waterbury 32° Masonic Learning Center for Children. I am Cheryl Sharkis, the Director and a Tutor at the Learning Center.

We are proud to report to you that the Learning Center continues to develop and progress forward. We have celebrated the achievements of 30 youngsters. Upon completion of their work at the Center, all have progressed at least 2 to 3 grade levels in their reading skills, with many surpassing this average. At present, we have experienced 5 Celebration of Achievement Ceremonies. Alumni continue to periodically stop by to share their achievements and upcoming plans.

The Learning Center staff currently includes 8 Initial Level Tutors, with two additional Trainees submitting paperwork for certification at the end of this July. Two Tutors continue studying and working towards certification at the Advanced Level. I have achieved Advanced Level Certification and I continue to plug along with my grad work. Our next Tutor Training cycle is scheduled to begin September 28th. We are always on the lookout for a few good Tutor Trainees, so if you or someone you know is interested please contact the Learning Center.

The Learning Center is currently providing tutorial sessions to 25 youngsters. We anticipate the enrollment to increase to 26 in July. Once again, we are in the process of finalizing each youngster's annual progress assessment and we are thrilled to report that everyone is progressing and developing, with the gap between their grade levels and performance levels reducing significantly. There are approximately 10 youngsters remaining on the waitlist. If you know of a child that may benefit from participating in the Learning Center Program, please encourage their families to contact the Learning Center.

We are all very proud to be participating in such a positive and empowering youth program. Enabling these youngsters to better achieve their academic potential is magnificently rewarding and uplifting for all involved. Individual generosity, the admirable drive of our Marathon Man, and all the continued support from the supporting Masonic bodies perpetuates the rewards. RULES AND REGULATIONS

for the

CONNECTICUT COUNCIL OF DELIBERATION ANCIENT ACCEPTED SCOTTISH RITE OF FREEMASONARY

ARTICLE I

Title and Allegiance

- Sec. 1 This Council shall be known as "Connecticut Council of Deliberation of the Ancient Accepted Scottish Rite of Freemasonry".
- Sec. 2 It is formed under and hereby acknowledges and yields allegiance to the Supreme Council of Sovereign Grand Inspectors General of the Thirty-third and last degree of the Ancient Accepted Scottish Rite of Freemasory for the Northern Masonic Jurisdiction of the United States of America, having its Grand East in the City of Lexington, Massachusetts.

ARTICLE II

Meetings, Notices, Quorum

- Sec. 1 The Connecticut Council of Deliberation shall meet annually. The time and place of each Annual Meeting shall be determined by the Council, provided, however, that such time and place of meeting may be changed by the Deputy for any reason deemed by him to require such action.
- Sec. 2 A special meeting of this Council may be called by the Deputy for such time and place within this State as he shall determine, or by this Council at any annual meeting.
- Sec. 3 Written or printed notice of each annual or special meeting of this Council shall be given by the Secretary, to be served either personally or by mail, to each member at least Ten (10) days before said meeting. Such notice shall state the purpose thereof.
- Sec. 4 Accredited representatives of a majority of the Scottish Rite Bodies in this State shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

ARTICLE III

Members, Officers

- Sec. 1 The members of this Council of Deliberation shall be such as are prescribed by the Supreme Council.
- Sec. 2a The Council shall elect the following officers at each annual meeting to hold office for one year or until their successors shall be elected and installed:

First Lieutenant Commander Second Lieutenant Commander Minister of State Chancellor Prior Treasurer

Secretary

Master of Ceremonies

Hospitaler Seneschal Standard Bearer Guard Sentinel

- Sec. 2b The Commander in Chief shall appoint a member of this Council of Deliberation as Grand Historian who shall keep a record of all events of historical significance and report thereon to this Council annually.
- Sec. 3 In case of vacancy in any office, by death, removal from the jurisdiction or otherwise, or failure to elect officers in this Council, the Illustrious Commander in Chief may make appointments to be in force until the next annual meeting.
- Sec. 4 Each officer of this Council shall perform the duties customarily incident to his office in accordance with Masonic usage and shall perform such other duties as may be assigned to him by resolution of this Council or by the Illustrious Commander in Chief.
- Sec. 5 The officers shall be installed at the annual meeting or as soon thereafter as practicable.
- Sec. 6 Scottish Rite Bodies in this State may elect members of the Rite in good standing in the Northern Jurisdiction as Honorary Members under such rules and regulations as their By-Laws may prescribe; provided, however, that no member of a Valley may be elected an Honorary member of the Valley in which he is a member.
- Sec. 7 Semi-Public Installation of the Officers of Scottish Rite Bodies in this State is permitted.
- Sec. 8 A personal contact shall be made with each resident Connecticut member of the Scottish Rite before he can be suspended or dropped from membership for non-payment of dues and assessments. The Thrice Potent Master of each Valley shall be responsible for the personal contact in his Valley, and a report shall be made available to the Secretary of the Valley, The Secretary shall retain the report for future reference and the records.
- Sec. 9a This Council of Deliberation authorizes the holding of dual memberships for members of the Scottish Rite in the Northern Masonic Jurisdiction.
- Sec. 9b A member of the Rite holding membership in a Valley outside of this State may apply for dual membership in a Valley in this state provided dual membership is permitted in the state of his membership, or a waiver of jurisdiction is obtained.
- Sec. 9c A dual member shall be required to pay the customary dues of the bodies, which he joins, but no fee becoming a dual member shall be charged.

ARTICLE IV

Standing Committees

Sec. 1 - At the close of each annual meeting, the Illustrious Commander in Chief, or in his absence the presiding officer, shall appoint the following Standing Committees to Continue in office until a new Committee be appointed:

Committee on Business Committee on Credentials

Committee on. Dispensations and Charters

Committee on Finance
Committee on Meritorious Service Award
Committee on Necrology
Committee on Next Place of Meeting
Committee on Nominations
Committee on Rules and Regulations
Committee on State of the Pite

Committee on State of the Rite

Committee on Insurance

- Sec. 2 The Committee on Business shall review the address of the Illustrious Commander in Chief and shall make recommendations regarding the apportionment and disposition of the several parts of the Address.
- Sec. 3 The Committee on Credentials shall pass on the qualifications of every person presenting himself for attendance at each annual or special meeting of this Council and to report thereon at such meeting.
- Sec. 4 The Committee on Dispensations and Charters shall investigate every application for a dispensation or charter and make a written recommendations thereon to this Council.
- Sec. 5 The Committee on Finance shall audit the books and accounts of the Secretary, Treasurer and Hospitaler and make a written report thereon at the annual meeting of this Council. It shall prepare and present a budget of estimated receipts and expenditures for the ensuing year.
- Sec. 6 The Committee on Meritorious Service Award shall consist of five members of the Supreme Council, one from each of the five Valleys in the State. It shall be the duty of this committee to receive and consider the nominations from the various Valleys and to make recommendations to this Council, at each annual meeting thereof, of members of the Rite in this state to receive the Meritorious Service Award.
- Sec. 7 The Committee on Necrology shall report at each meeting of this Council the names, degrees, titles and date of death, of all members of the Supreme Council in this State dying during the preceding year, together with similar data on such other outstanding Masonic leaders as it may deem proper.
- Sec. 8 The Committee on Next Place of Meeting shall recommend at each annual meeting of this Council a place for subsequent annual meeting or meetings of this Council.
- Sec. 9 The Committee on Nominations shall consist of the members of the Supreme Council accredited to this State. It shall be the duty of such Committee to nominate candidate for election to the offices of this Council at each meeting place.
- Sec. 10 The Committee on Rules and Regulations shall consider all matters pertaining to the laws, rules, regulations and jurisprudence referred to it by the Deputy or by this Council and shall make recommendations thereon.
- Sec. 11 The Committee on State of the Rite shall consider throughout the year all matters pertaining to the State of the Rite in this State, make recommendations to the Deputy from time to time, and it shall make a written report to this Council at each annual meeting.
- Sec. 12 The Committee on Insurance shall consist of three members who shall administer all insurance and related matters pertaining to the Scottish Rite Bodies in the State of Connecticut.

ARTICLE V Finances

- Sec. I The Secretary of each body of the Rite in this State shall, annually, at least seven days prior to the annual meeting forward to the Secretary of the Council of Deliberation a detailed statement of the proceeding year's work and a remittance of the per capita tax of thirty-five cents (\$0.35) per each member on it roll of membership as of May 31st.
- Sec. 2 This Council at any annual or special meeting may vote assessments on the Bodies of the Rite in this State as this Council shall deem proper, provided, however, that every such additional assessment shall be designated for some particular purpose and shall be used only for that purpose.
- Sec. 3 The fiscal year of this Council shall begin on the first day of August in each year and shall end on the 31st. day of July in the next succeeding year.
- Sec. 4 No money shall be drawn on the Treasurer except upon a warrant signed by the Secretary, countersigned by the Illustrious Commander in Chief, and issued in payment of an appropriation or in accordance with an order previously made by this Council.
- Sec. 5 The Secretary, Treasurer, and Hospitaler of this Council of Deliberation shall be bonded in such manner and in such amount as shall be determined by resolution of the Council, or in default of such determination then determined by the Deputy, the premium on such bonds to be paid by this Council.

ARTICLE VI

Jurisdiction of Valleys

Sec. 1 - Each Valley in this State shall have concurrent jurisdiction within the State of Connecticut.

ARTICLE VII

Meritorious Service Award

- Sec. 1a An award to be known as the "Illustrious Arthur M. Brown, 33°, Meritorious Service Award" is hereby established for the State of Connecticut. It shall be conferred upon Scottish Rite Masons who, by reason of meritorious services of a Masonic character, are worthy and should be so cited.
- Sec. 1b The Award shall consist of a jewel in memory of the late Deputy for this State, III. Arthur M. Brown, 33°.
- Sec 1c The recipients must have received the grade of Sublime Prince of the Royal Secret.
- Sec. 1d -The award shall be limited to one member for each 1000 members per Valley, with no Valley entitled to less than one each year provided the Valley is in good standing. (N.B. Constitutional limitation not to exceed one per body in each Valley.) (Art. 901-d).
- Sec. 2 The following procedure shall be followed by this Council relative to selecting those who are to receive such awards and in presenting the awards to those selected.

- Sec. 2a The presiding officers of the Bodies of the Rite in the State shall present recommendations in writing to the Council of Deliberation, nominating the member or members of their Bodies whom they feel should receive the award. No presiding officer is eligible to receive this award while he is involved in the nominating process.
- Sec. 2b Such nominations shall be referred to the Standing Committee on Meritorious Service Award at least one month prior to the annual meeting of this Council, except that by unanimous consent of this Council nominations may be referred to the Committee at the annual meting for consideration at that annual meeting.
- Sec. 2c -The Committee on Meritorious Service Award shall consider the nominations referred to it from the various Valleys and shall make recommendations to this Council, at each annual meeting thereof, of members of the Rite in this State to receive the Meritorious Service Award.
- Sec. 3 -The presentation of the award and insignia shall be made by the Deputy, or someone selected by him. Such presentation shall be made either in the Valley in which the recipient is a member or at a meeting of the Council of Deliberation, as the Deputy may determine.
- Sec. 4 The jewel shall consist of an ornamented gold bar, one and a half inches long, with the words "Connecticut Council of Deliberation" in gold letters set in red enamel. A second gold bar, one and a quarter inches long, is suspended from the first bar by five gold links. On this bar shall be the words "Ill. Arthur M. Brown, 33°, Meritorious Service Award" in gold letters set in red enamel. A double headed eagle, emblem of the Thirty-Second Degree is suspended from this second bar by three gold links. The figures "32" are of gold set in a triangle of black enamel. The height of the jewel shall be two and three-quarters inches.

ARTICLE VIII

Amendments

- Sec. I By Amendment of Supreme Council Constitutions, etc. Upon amendment of the constitutions and Regulations of the Supreme Council of Sovereign Grand Inspectors General of the Thirty-third and last degree of the Ancient Accepted Scottish Rite of Freemasonry for the Northern Masonic Jurisdiction of the United States of America, or upon the promulgation or any decree of said Supreme Council, inconsistent with any provision of these Rules and Regulations, then in every such event, and without any further act or deed whatsoever, these Rules and Regulations shall be deemed to be and shall be automatically amended in conformity therewith.
- Sec. 2 By Council of Deliberation, these Rules and Regulations may be amended at any annual meeting of this Council by a majority vote of the members present, provided the proposed amendment or amendments have been presented at the proceeding annual meeting, and due notice thereof shall have been given to the members and provided, further, that an amendment or amendments may be adopted at the annual meeting at which it is presented, by a two-thirds vote of the members present, thirty (30) days notice of the proposed amendment or amendments having been given to the members.

Sec. 3 - All By-Laws, Rules and Regulations previously adopted by this Council are hereby rescinded.
