MEMBERS

ARTICLE 200 - The Active, Emeriti and Honorary Members of the Supreme Council accredited to each State; the Past First and Past Second Lieutenant Commanders of the Council of Deliberation; the Past Commanders-in-Chief of Consistories; the Past Most Wise Masters of Chapters of Rose Croix; the Past Sovereign Princes of Councils of Princes of Jerusalem; the Past Thrice Potent Masters of Lodges of Perfection; those members of Subordinate Bodies in the State who have received the Meritorious Service Award from the Council of Deliberation of such State, and the first three elected officers as well as the Treasurer and the Secretary of Subordinate Bodies, shall constitute a Council of Deliberation for that State of which the Deputy for that State shall be ex officio Illustrious Commander-in-Chief.

ARTICLE 329 - The first three officers as well as the Treasurer and the Secretary of each Subordinate Body shall be elected. All other officers shall be elected, or appointed by the presiding officer of the Body as the Rules and Regulations of the Body provide.

PROXIES

ARTICLE 201 - Any Officer of a Subordinate Body of the Rite who is entitled to a seat in the Council of Deliberation for his State, but is unable to be present at any session of such Council, may appoint as his proxy, to act in his stead, any member of such Subordinate Body, provided, however, that such proxy shall not represent more than one member of such Council.

ALLOCUTION OF THE ILLUSTRIOUS COMMANDER-IN-CHIEF

There's a maxim that says, "Charity begins at home," and I'm pleased to have us utilize fine facilities like today's, and spreading that charity among our Masonic organizations.

My thanks go to the Valley of Norwich for being our host today, and being the belly masons that we tend to be, I'm sure we'll enjoy the ICE principal later this afternoon during our social time and dinner.

A special thanks also to all of the distinguished guests who have graced us with their presence this afternoon.

NECROLOGY

Time and tide wait for no one, and since our last session, the tide has erased from the sands of life the names of good and faithful brothers. They include:

Brother Richard L. Smail, MSA from the Valley of New Haven. Brother Smail was presented his cap and jewel on June 20, 1977. He also served as the presiding officer of all three bodies in the Valley. He served as Sovereign Prince in 1973; Thrice Potent Master in 1978; and Most Wise Master in 1987.

Brother Ernest J. (Jack) Smith, MSA, from the Valley of Hartford. Brother Jack received his award on June 6, 2002.

We are also saddened by the loss of Brother William A. Bonney, Sr., from the Valley of Hartford, who served his Rite as Sovereign Prince in 1974-1975.

Brother James D. Morin from the Valley of Hartford, also served in the capacity of Sovereign Prince in 1995-96.

Though their names may be erased from the sands of life, the memory of these good and faithful brothers will remain etched in our hearts and minds forever.

Our Prior, Ill. Brother Donald L. Smith, will now offer a prayer in memory of these brothers.

STATE OF THE RITE

You'll hear in a short while the report of the *Committee on the State of the Rite*, as compiled by the Junior Past Commander-in-Chief's of our 3 Consistories. Here in Connecticut the ICE principle of "*Inspiration, Convenience*, and *Enjoyment*" is taking effect in varying degrees and speeds, and I feel we're heading in the right direction, but we need to accelerate our efforts if we hope to at least keep pace with our losses by death and non payment of dues.

You'll also hear the report from the *Strategic Planning Committee* on the progress and pitfalls that they have encountered, and I sincerely hope that each Valley continue to incorporate those portions of the Plan that best suit your particular Valley.

LEARNING CENTER

On Saturday, May 15, the Learning Center conducted the largest *Celebration of Achievement* they've ever held since opening. The success of the Orton-Gillingham Method is extremely evident if you've ever had the privilege of being present at any of the *Celebrations*.

You'll hear reports from our center director, Cheryl Sharkis, Ill. Charles W. Yohe, 33°, Chairman of our Board of Governors, and Ill. David L. Sharkis, 33°, associate, so I won't be redundant, but will allow them to tell you first hand of what's happening at the Center.

I do want to acknowledge at this time however, the dedicated, enthusiastic and untiring work of our center director, the tutors, the scholars, the administrative staff, (A.J.) for their unselfish efforts to help as many of the students as they can within the time and space constraints they have to deal with.

I also want to congratulate the board of governors for accepting the challenges of the newly imposed budget requirements, and moving forward with programs to ensure the financial future of the Center. My grateful and heartfelt thanks for all who have contributed to both the current as well as the future success of our Learning Center.

CONCLUSION

Every group within our fraternity is facing the same challenges, that of finding new members, retention of members, and losses by death of existing members. The Supreme Council continues to assist us in addressing those issues, with the Leadership Conference in March, the Secretaries Conference in June, the Membership Seminar in September, the Masonic Ambassadors Program, the Scottish Rite Tool Chest, and DVD's. Additionally, regular information updates are sent to the Valley Secretaries and others as to new innovations for all of the above mentioned programs, but my brothers, these are NOT auto-start programs that you just plug in and wait for results to start generating. Each of us needs to embrace these AIDS, and by the sweat of our brow and the work of our hands, find ways to bring to fruition the core values of them by increasing our numbers of brothers by a combination of what works best for each of the Valleys.

Someone once said, "Lead, follow, or get out of the way". Brothers, options 2 and 3 are no longer available to the Scottish Rite. For too long we've allowed people to get out of the way and sit on the sidelines, with little or no participation. We still need a few followers, but it's awfully easy to slip in behind a leader and then sit down and see what the leader has in store for us. What we need now, more than ever before in our history, is a whole group of leaders to take us forward to greater success for our beloved Rite.

The leaders may bump into other leaders on occasion, but if we're all headed in the same direction, the necessary corrections will get made, and the effort will be strengthened by the combined energy and dedication to or beloved Rite. So Mote It Be!

REPORT OF THE ACTIVE

To the Illustrious Commander-in-Chief, officers, and brethren of the Connecticut Council of Deliberation in session at Niantic, Connecticut on June 11, 2010:

I will always remember the last year as the one when reality set in. It began with attending my first Supreme Council session as an Active member and the pace and workload just seemed to ramp-up from there. I can now say that I fully understand the magnitude and responsibility that has been entrusted to me and I am resolute that I will do all within my abilities to serve our beloved Scottish Rite in a manner consistent with those who preceded me. My confidence is bolstered by the support and guidance I have received from our Deputy, the Illustrious James R. Spencer, Jr., from my fraternal brothers, and most importantly from my family. I am also growing more physically able to be up to the task ahead, becoming a bit leaner, in response to a challenge from a dear friend and brother. When I do get a chance to stop and reflect, I realize how lucky a man I am.

Last year I asked your patience and cooperation as I pledged to travel our Valleys to observe and learn more about the issues facing Connecticut Scottish Rite. I was also intrigued by our Sovereign Grand Commander's continued emphasis on the application of sound business practices within our Rite. It is important that our membership experiences Inspiration, Convenience, and Enjoyment, but for that to happen, we, the leaders of our fraternity, must employ the same processes that our found in the business world. Yes, thanks to Commander McNaughton we all know much more about hedgehogs than we would have ever anticipated, but the challenge is to take this analogy and expand upon it. As we move further into the $21^{\rm st}$ century, we need to anticipate and prepare for the challenges that lie ahead.

When I make an unannounced visit to my boss, whose office is just down the street from the Supreme Council headquarters, he often asks me what brings me to

Lexington, my paying job, or my "other" job? We laugh, because more often than not is some combination of the two. On one such occasion, the answer was my paying job, however on the drive home my thoughts were fully focused on how applicable the meetings that took place that day were to my "other" job. The meeting of the day dealt with how we were going to handle what most would describe as a good problem. Our organization was looking at a 100% growth target in the next 4 years. We would double in size and be required to hire close to 2,000 new employees. Many of these employees would come from Generation Y – with a completely new set of expectations and values. We spent hours that day, and many since, discussing how to engage this new generation, how to quench their thirst for development, participation, information, and work-life balance. On my ride home, I realized that the Scottish Rite was looking at a similar challenge. Commander McNaughton is correct, our fraternity does face many of the same issues found in the corporate world. Maybe the magnitude of the problem was not 100% growth in four years. Would it not be great if it were? Nevertheless, is not the Scottish Rite, and Freemasonry in general, beginning to see a renewed level of interest? Class sizes are increasing and several Connecticut Blue Lodges are conducting multiple degree rotations. If we are ready, this situation presents a great opportunity. If we are not, trust me, this generation, with its instantaneous modes of communication, will quickly learn that Freemasonry is not for them. So what is it we have to do?

I am certain there are multiple answers to that question that can result in hours of good debate. I welcome any opportunity to hear your thoughts on the subject. I would like to offer one such answer for consideration. It involves providing our membership with increased opportunity to become involved. As I write this report, I can envision you who sit before me, the dedicated hardworking brothers who keep our Rite functioning. Many of you would also be quick to admit that at times you are overworked, have too much on your plate. So on one hand we have new members seeking opportunity and on the other hand we have experienced members who are overworked. Could the answer be as simple as transferring some of the duties from the overworked to those who seek involvement? If so, how do we make this transition happen? Let me offer a few questions for reflection, something for each of you to think about during your ride home today. Maybe the solution to our challenge lies somewhere within the answers to these questions.

For those members of our Valley officer corps, those wearing the yellow caps, do you truly "run" the Scottish Rite Body you represent? Do you actively participate in the selection and scheduling of your degrees? Do you work to fill your casts with new members? Do you engage with your other Valley officers to coordinate your efforts and to offer new programs that embrace the ICE principle? On the other hand, do you wait for your Valley secretary to publish the trestle board and fill the casts with the same brothers, many of who have portrayed these roles for many years? Are you an active officer or are you a passive officer?

To our MSAs, those hardworking brothers in the red caps, many of you have been recognized for your efforts behind the scenes. When asked, you are quick to offer your time and talents. How many times have you turned the tables, approached a brother, and asked him for assistance? Have you taken the opportunity to share your behind the scenes knowledge with others, perhaps giving them an opportunity to someday be rewarded with a red cap?

To those out there who do not know how to say no, our Honorary Members of the Supreme Council wearing the white caps, you have been recognized for your outstanding individual contributions to our fraternity and your community. As a recipient of the 33^{rd} degree, we ask you to move away from your individual contributor role to that of a leader.

Chances are you can look back and fondly remember a brother who served as your mentor, gave you a chance, and lit the fraternal fires within you. Now it is your turn to do the same for another. You are now the leader and mentor. Have you taken a new brother who shows particular promise by the hand and whispered wise council in his ear? Do you continue to fill the high profile roles in our degrees instead of tutoring an understudy, your replacement? Have you offered your service to your Valley officers, not telling them what to do, but instead assuming the role of coach and advisor? Have you ever experienced the joy of watching a brother make his successful stage debut, knowing that you played a role in that success? Have you given a worthy brother an opportunity to begin working on his Scottish Rite career so that someday he may be considered a candidate for the 33rd degree?

Finally, for those of us in the purple caps, have we done all we could to improve cooperation and communication between the Supreme Council and our Connecticut Scottish Rite brethren? Have we facilitated inter-valley cooperation? Have we adequately communicated the strategic plan and vision for the Scottish Rite of the Northern Masonic Jurisdiction? Have we put the processes in place to measure and track our progress towards that vision?

My brothers, all I ask of you today is to consider and reflect upon these questions. Each of us needs to exhibit a bias for action and be facilitators of change. We need to make a personal commitment to coach and mentor our replacements that will instantly provide opportunity for others. By doing so, we will free up our own time, either to sit back and enjoy, or lead new efforts to enhance our Scottish Rite. If we do not, I fear we will continue to watch new classes come and go without seeing any increase in the number of members sitting on the sidelines, without seeing any new faces at our dinners and degrees. Quickly this new generation of Freemasons will learn that the Scottish Rite is not the place to develop fraternal bonds and relationships, to continue to learn and apply the tenets of Freemasonry, but instead, just another organization that sends the occasional piece of mail, more often than not accompanied by a dues bill or some charitable plea, and we will have missed a great opportunity. My brothers, we have brothers knocking at our door seeking admission into the Scottish Rite to expand their fraternal knowledge through the sharing of experiences and the development of relationships. It is our collective duty, as the leaders of Connecticut Scottish Rite to serve them and give them what they seek.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON SCHOLARSHIPS

To the Illustrious Commander-in-Chief, officers, and brethren of the Connecticut Council of Deliberation in session at Niantic, Connecticut on June 11, 2010:

This year, the Supreme Council, located in Lexington, Massachusetts has awarded \$12,000.00 to Connecticut for Abbott Scholarships. The state scholarship committee of the Connecticut Council of Deliberation has recommended 12 applicants to become 2010 Abbott Scholarship recipients. These recommendations were made to Illustrious James R. Spencer, MSA, 33°, Deputy for Connecticut and to the Supreme Council.

Leon M. Abbott Scholarships provide financial support for the continuing education of young men and women from Scottish Rite families and Masonic-related youth programs. Since 1951, more that \$3 million has been awarded to students from each state of the Northern Masonic Jurisdiction.

Eligibility: The following criteria are used to determine the eligibility of applicants for the program:

A freshman, sophomore, junior, senior, or graduate student attending an accredited college or university.

A minimum grade point average of 2.75 on a 4.0 scale.

A child or grandchild of a Scottish Rite Mason in the Northern Masonic Jurisdiction.

A member of a youth organization sponsored by the Masonic fraternity in the Northern Masonic Jurisdiction.

A graduate of one of the 32° Masonic Learning Centers of Children in the Northern Masonic Jurisdiction.

The State Scholarship Committee received a total of 35 applications from the five Valleys in Connecticut. The 12 recipients of this year's scholarships demonstrated excellent scholarship and genuine financial need. Impressive letters of recommendations from teachers, professors, and academic counselors supported all applications. Recipients also exhibited extensive volunteer community service, broad extracurricular activities, leadership and honors/awards in sports, music, and drama. Some are holding part-time jobs during the school calendar year and full-time summer employment to help pay for college costs.

This year, all five Valleys in Connecticut have given their own college scholar-ships to applicants. The Valley of Bridgeport has given four scholarships, the Valley of Hartford has given twenty scholarships, the Valley of New Haven has given six scholarships, the Valley of Norwich has given four scholarships, and the Valley of Waterbury has given two scholarships. Collectively, our five valleys have awarded a total of thirty-seven scholarships.

REPORT OF THE MEMBERSHIP AND RETENTION COMMITTEE FOR THE STATE OF CONNECTICUT

To the Illustrious Commander-in-Chief, officers, and brethren of the Connecticut Council of Deliberation in session at Niantic, Connecticut on June 11, 2010:

The Chairman of the State Membership and Retention Committee respectfully submits the following report for the year 2009 - 2010.

Recognizing the importance of increasing our membership or at least minimizing losses of brothers over the years, the Supreme Council continues to sponsor annual leadership and membership seminars in Lexington, MA.

These seminars include presentations on the effectiveness of various membership attempts as well as break-out sessions that allow for brothers to share tales of what makes them successful and how things worked. As a result of this sharing, the Supreme Council has also developed a membership letter which contains a link to what is termed a membership tool box. In this way, valleys are writing up new things that work as well as attempts that didn't. By establishing this on line tool, the entire jurisdiction will have access to a complete array of new ideas, concepts, and methods.

It is hoped that brothers from all jurisdictions will utilize these tools as a means of increasing awareness of the Scottish Rite in their respective valleys and increase the number of those brothers who have decided to join.

Another extremely important part of both of these gatherings is the ability to form relationships with brothers from other valleys in other states. I personally have either contacted or been contacted by over 100 brothers sharing comments or ideas that worked or did not. It was this sharing that allowed Connecticut to venture forth into the establishment of its first ladies program ,which was given concurrently with the Consistory degrees portrayed in Newington on May 1 of this year.

Many valleys are looking at our rituals for ways of making them more interesting. This past spring, roughly 20 brothers from Connecticut went to the Valley of Providence, RI to witness the 16° being portrayed in a banquet format. It was so enjoyable many of our valleys are looking at duplicating it here in Connecticut. In fact, it was so well received that it is being portrayed again on July 17 at Supreme Council as part of the Sovereign Grand Commander's Day.

Our Commander has made it clear that we are first and foremost a fraternity and it is time to return to those roots. We need to concentrate on those things that we do very well and work to ensure we have the best brothers doing that work. We need to concentrate on the concept of ICE. Inspiration, Convenience, and Enjoyment. We also need to look at where our monies are being spent. The Commander has said that our fraternity is for the fraternity first. It is well and good that money is raised for charities but any valley that discontinues a fraternal event due to its desire to give the money to charity is doing itself, its member, and the Rite a huge disservice.

In Connecticut, all of the valleys have established the ambassador program within their districts. As a reminder, the ambassador can be to a specific lodge, group of lodges, or district. His job is to provide information on the Scottish Rite to any interested brother. It is also hoped that he will canvass any brother who has attained proficiency and has been a Master Mason for 6 months or more. We are definitely experiencing growth resulting from this personal touch by our ambassadors but please remember, as I said last year, it is critical to note that every brother here is an ambassador and it is your enthusiasm that will impress prospective candidates.

While growth is slow, there is a steady core of brothers dedicated to increasing our membership within our state and their efforts are bearing fruit. In 2009, 72 Connecticut brothers witnessed the 4°,making them eligible to be considered Scottish Rite Masons. In 2010 that number increased to 76, which is a 6% increase over last year. But as Brother Bill has alluded to in his message on the State of the Rite, we have a long way to go and much work to do. At last we have vision, direction, and excellent tools with which to perform the work set before us.

Retention

I have been harping for the last few years on the need to enlist newly created brothers in our work. Some, we know, are just going for the ride through the degrees but there are many in our classes who are just waiting to be asked. We all know how difficult it is to come forward and unfortunately, reticence to request has become a natural part of our fraternity but, as has been established, almost anyone will at least consider a request to serve. The brothers we lose are the ones who are not asked and truly are left with the feeling that no one cares. We can no longer wait to be asked or expect volunteers. Brothers need to feel that they are a part of a greater good. They need to be proactively approached and asked for their assistance with our work.

Unfortunately I do not have the statistics from all valleys this year but I can tell you that those valleys who have reported indicate ongoing 65% participation of their newly created sublime princes in some way within their valleys. There is still 35% to go and while perfection can only be striven for, it is obvious that we need to continue to strive.

Recommendations

We need to remember a charge from our 14th degree and I am paraphrasing, "In this world, Master Masons only know the Scottish Rite through the lives of individual Sublime Princes." Let us therefore endeavor to live, act ,and speak so that all may know the high ideals for which we stand.

Let us continue to work to contact and engage our newly created SPRS in the hope that we can put them to work and they can enrich our fraternity with their service.

We need to continue to have a social aspect in our fraternity. Meetings should not end with the degrees but with a gathering period of some kind. We don't want brothers to bolt out the door. We want them to talk to each other, make each other feel welcome, share ideas out of the formalness of the lodge room, and, most importantly, we want them to enjoy the fraternal aspect of our beloved fraternity.

Please continue to remember and keep within your thoughts the single word ICE; Inspiration, Convenience, and Enjoyment. This is our continuing mandate for all our work to make sure it incorporates all three.

The best memorial to a lost active brother is the work we do to keep our Valley as a positive contributing force within our fraternity and community. In addition to our continued work to meet the goals and objectives of the long-range plan, we are working to rekindle the fires in our inactive members.

The membership committee has been soliciting the new members to find out what their interests are. We have had a huge response from our new Sublime Princes. They have become active in the Valley by taking speaking parts, becoming Valley officers, and working as stage hands in the degrees. In many cases we are using them in more than one position. Even though we are continuingly losing brothers to the Grand Architect of the Universe, we are proud to have brought in 13 new members in the last year and over 80% of those became involved in some way within the Valley.

We have also initiated an ambassador program thoughout the 8th District and are working on establishing ambassadors within the 9th District as well.

We are very proud to support the CTCHIP program by making an annual donation and supporting every event in the area. We also support the North Stonington Fair by operating a food booth. Both CTCHIP and our participation in the North Stonington Fair have brought us out to the community. We have seen a great interest in the Scottish Rite in recent months which we attribute to increased utilization of the newly made Sublime Princes in all of our Valley activities, as well as the excitement shared by all the Valley brethren when discussing the Scottish Rite.

Retention

We have been blessed to have added 13 brothers in our Lodge of Perfection this year. Unfortunately we lost 89 brothers to death, suspensions, and dimits. We have also embarked on an aggressive campaign to utilize all newly created Sublime Princes in some fashion within the Valley. Taking the first step rather than wait to be asked has paid huge dividends and has resulted in increased vibrancy and enthusiasm as well as increased class sizes.

We have continued to focus on our brothers who through hardship or age have been reluctant to continue in the Scottish Rite Valley of Norwich. Through attention to the unsaid messages sent by our brothers and dues abatements where indicated, we have again reduced the requests for dimits and suspensions for non-payment of dues. Retention results from caring and communication and we are striving to improve both of these areas.

We have improved our communications by the utilization of e-mail for those that would prefer it. This increases the timeliness of the information being received by the brothers. We are also in the ongoing process of creating and refining e-mail blast lists that will allow quick communication and reminders to all brothers who have signed up.

We are continuing to request the assistance of the members in the support of our scholarship programs, both local and Abbott.

All these activities, coupled with the Supreme Council programs of Children's Learning Centers, the Northern Light Magazine, Abbott Scholarships, and the Museum of Our National Heritage, provide that extra reason to sustain membership and to think about the positive effects that paying dues provides.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE STATE OF THE RITE

To the Illustrious Commander-in-Chief, officers, and brethren on the Connecticut Council of Deliberation in session at Niantic, Connecticut on June 11, 2010:

The 2009-2010 Scottish Rite year has been marked by continued and expanding cooperation between our Valleys, greater efforts to attract new members, and more opportunities to join and work with our brethren of Prince Hall.

SUPREME COUNCIL

Three Brothers of the Rite in Connecticut were coroneted with the Thirty-Third Degree and were created Sovereign Grand Inspectors General and Honorary Members of the Supreme Council at the Supreme Council Session in Boston, Massachusetts last August. Eric W. Manner of the Valley of Hartford, Charles W. Yohe of the Valley of Norwich and Ralph Walker Rose, MSA of the Valley of Waterbury became the newest Honorary Members of the Supreme Council.

This year Connecticut is fortunate to have six candidates. Our 2010 class is one of the largest classes in recent memory, Whitney P. McNulty, MSA of the Valley of Bridgeport, Newton Buckner, III, of the Valley of Hartford, Martin Ede, M.S.A. of the Valley of New Haven, Winston S. Dean, MSA and Carl J. Mossberg, MSA of the Valley of Norwich, and Russell W. Griswold, MSA of the Valley of Waterbury have been elected to receive the Thirty-Third Degree in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania during the August 2010 Supreme Council Session.

Membership

The great tide of men who flooded on to our membership rolls after returning victorious from the Second World War is now well into its ebb as those brothers continue to answer the call of the Grand Architect and lay down the working tools of life. This mortality is a dagger at the heart of Freemasonry and especially the Scottish Rite.

40% of our membership is over 75 years of age; under 30% of Blue Lodge members are Scottish Rite members.

We urge all Valleys to take advantage of the Membership and Leadership Seminars offered by the Supreme Council. We have attended the Membership Seminar, held September 24 and 25 and the Leadership Seminar held March 26 and 27. They were excellent, even better than last year, and allowed for not only the exchange of ideas but cemented fraternal bonds and friendships forged beyond state lines throughout the Jurisdiction.

The Ambassador Program presented at the Membership Seminar is being implemented. Ambassadors are being appointed. Thought is being given as to how Scottish Rite Masonry can help Blue Lodge Masonry attract good men. And, there does seem to be anecdotal evidence of a societal change. Young men seem to be looking for something larger than themselves. My lodge has had a noticeable increase in interest, almost all of it from young men who have found us on the Internet.

Scottish Rite in Connecticut continues to benefit from the Supreme Council web site, the Connecticut Council of Deliberation web site, and the web sites of all our Valleys. The Connecticut sites have been up for approximately a year and continue to be managed by Ill. Francis G. Way, MSA, 33°. Under Ill. Brother Frank's management our sites are now offering the information, functionality, and connectivity we all need. It is clear they are being used and we are receiving petitions as a result.

My brothers this is a new age. In the past Valleys traveled as Valleys, today individual Scottish Rite Masons are able to find the degrees they need to fill their Passports and are traveling by themselves or in small groups to accomplish that goal. That is enthusiasm.

LEARNING CENTERS

Our Connecticut Learning Center for Dyslexic Children in Waterbury is continuing to assist young people to overcome dyslexia. This past May 12 kids were sent out into the larger world in far better shape to succeed than when they arrived.

Our Deputy, Ill. James R. Spencer, Jr., MSA, 33°, the Connecticut Active Members, and our Chairman, Charles W. Yohe, are working to strengthen the Waterbury Learning Center Board of Governors to broaden its membership to include men and women from outside our fraternity and increase its ability to fundraise locally.

Our Board of Governors has stepped up to the challenge. New fundraisers organized and held include a car show in Waterbury and a wine tasting in New Haven. More events are planned. Please support our Learning Center whenever and however you can. Anything you can do will be worth the effort.

MASONIC YOUTH

The Valleys continue to support the Order of DeMolay and the Order of Rainbow for Girls, both financially and with donations of time. These young people are not only our hope for the future but also the hope of society in the years to come. They continue to merit our support and encouragement. This year all four Lodges of Perfection in Connecticut were presented plaques by Brother Harry Needham, III, MSA, Executive Officer of Connecticut DeMolay and Active Member of the International Supreme Council of DeMolay as a thank you for our continued support of Connecticut DeMolay.

VALLEY ACTIVITIES

Connecticut Consistory, Lafayette Consistory, and Nathan Hale Consistory with the Valleys of the Connecticut Council of Deliberation, have conferred the necessary degrees. Collectively, they have conferred the 4th (both the old and the new) 5th, 7th, 11th, 13th, 14th, 15th, 16th, 17th, 18th, 19th, 20th, 25th, 31st, and the 32nd degrees.

This year has been a year to work together for all three consistories in Connecticut.

On November 14, as a result of the Sovereign Grand Commander's decree, the three Northern Masonic Jurisdiction consistories as well as our two brother consistories from Prince Hall joined in New Haven to portray the 31st and 32nd degrees. On that day we had the honor of being addressed by Ill. Brother Solomon Wallace, 33°, Sovereign Grand Commander for the United Supreme Council, Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite, Prince Hall Affiliates. Many fraternal friendships were made and renewed.

On May 1st Ill. Brother John William McNaughton, 33°, Sovereign Grand Commander of the Northern Masonic Jurisdiction of the United States of America, made an official visitation to Connecticut. Much has been accomplished. More is needed if we are to succeed in stabilizing and increasing our membership.

STRATEGIC PLAN FOR THE STATE OF CONNECTICUT

To the Illustrious Commander-in-Chief, officers, and brethren of the Connecticut Council of Deliberation in session at Niantic Connecticut on June 11, 2010:

Connecticut AASR Strategic Plan

Last year the Council adopted a significantly modified and streamlined mission statement, setting the tone to guide the five Valleys in developing their goals in the coming years.

The committee met again this spring and reviewed the Council Mission statement and strategies. With a degree of modesty, we really like the mission statement and strategies, reaffirm their relevance, and we do not recommend modifications at this time.

Valley Strategic Planning

We are pleased to report the five Valleys continue to monitor and modify their strategic plans as they deem appropriate for their respective Valleys. The Valleys are working to align their efforts to be consistent with the Council mission and strategies of programs and activities that are inspirational, convenient, and enjoyable. Efforts also continue to strengthen future leadership.

Each Valley reports the following efforts.

The Valley of Bridgeport is continuing efforts to modify their planning to incorporate the "ICE" concept of Inspiration, Convenience, and Enjoyment, understanding they are critical to bringing out their existing brothers, to bringing in new brothers, and keeping them all active. The executive committee is focusing on the following objectives: establishing an ambassador program to spread the word of Scottish Rite Masonry; identifying degree portrayals at other valleys and organizing trips as part of a "Fill Your Passport" program; and continued strategies to improve communications to Valley membership. With regard to leadership, the Valley will continue attendance at the Lexington leadership conferences and is in the process of developing a succession plan for the Valley secretary and treasurer.

The Valley of Hartford has continued to modify their strategic planning to incorporate the ideals of inspiration, convenience, enjoyment, and leadership development, and to streamline their strategic plan. With that in mind, the executive committee has been focused on establishing the Valley as the place to be. To improve communications, the executive committee changed email delivery to *Constant Contact*, which allows the use of logos, personalized email, and greater flexibility and control when sending information concerning Valley activities; continued fine tuning of the Ambassador program; consolidation of the membership and retention committees; continued participation in the Lexington leadership programs and Valley leadership training for line officers; continued Valley pre-degree dinners, graduating class dinners, family life active,

including, the Rockcats baseball game, theatre nights, field trips, and community and and charitable activities, and supporting Theatre on Stage in Newington and the Learning Center 5K Road Race.

The Valley of New Haven strategies have continued to focus on interaction with lodges in the Valley and building strong family bonds within the fraternity. These efforts have led to continued support of their degree team for the second half of the MM degree and active Family Life programs such as the summer and winter picnics (the summer picnic in conjunction with the Dusis Society) as well as dinner theaters, most recently performing "A Night with Abe." Addressing their membership objective, their membership programs continue to do well with Scottish Rite information nights open to non-Masons, along with the Octoberfest-themed meeting that is open to non-Scottish Rite Masons. For the spring, the goal is to perform the 16th degree during the dinner as has been done in Rhode Island and they have started offering refreshments of all types after degree portrayals to encourage brothers to stay and socialize. Their email notices and website have been improved and now cast members can download the degrees they are in from a password-protected part of the site. There is a continued effort to improve stage props with new costumes and the Valley recently acquired a digital projector for the use during degree portrayals as well as for use during Valley meetings as a way of disseminating information to attendees, thereby minimizing paper waste.

The Valley of Norwich is nearing the end of its 5-year Long Range Plan and will begin the process of modifying their plan to reflect the initiatives of "ICE." Although there have been no revisions to the plan, the Valley is continuing to focus on membership development and retention. Like Hartford, the Valley has upgraded the email communication system by utilizing *Constant Contact*. Further, attention to the goal of reaching out to lodges in Districts 8 and 9 has been very successful in getting the word out about Scottish Rite Masonry and attracting candidates.

The Valley of Waterbury began the process of streamlining their strategic plan last year and it continues to be a work in process. Membership growth is a key concern of the executive committee and the Valley is continuing their efforts to reach out to the area lodges with informational presentations and use of their Fellowcraft degree team. Following the goal of enjoyable activities, the executive committee is continuing with their scholarship programs and Family Life activities.

Summary

It is hard to believe this process started seven-years ago with a meeting in Meriden. We were charged with two daunting tasks: develop a strategic plan for the Council, and then go back and develop plans appropriate for our respective Valleys.

Even though we had a clean slate, we were heavily influenced by the Supreme Council Strategic Plan. Over time we began to focus on issues specific to Connecticut and each Valley began to identify goals they wanted to accomplish as Valleys to become

more focused on identifying their goals and what they needed to do to accomplish them. But with all goal setting, it is a process of improvement and by having all of the Valleys work together collectively on the Council plan, we have also benefited from the exchange of ideas resulting in a stronger, more fraternal, Connecticut Scottish Rite. That said: there are common threads winding through all of the plans that will continue to be core objectives; those of addressing membership development and retention; leadership; degree and non-degree activities, and financial stability.

The Committee would like to thank our Illustrious Commander-in-Chief, officers and brethren of the Connecticut Council of Deliberation for giving us the opportunity to participate in this very important process.

Greetings from the board of governors.

Will the members of the Board of Governors who are present please stand and be recognized. My brothers, these dedicated volunteers continue to endeavor to keep the Learning Center viable. Please join with me in offering your appreciation for their time and efforts. Thank you for your continued support and you may be seated. Our 32 Degree Masonic Learning Center for Children continues to be impacted by the uncertainty that is rampant in the financial markets and the U.S. economy. The doors of the Center remain open largely through the generosity of our Scottish Rite Valleys and individuals here in Connecticut.

We continue to assist the maximum number of young people that can be accommodated by the existing center. For the fiscal year 2011, which begins on September 1, 2010, the Waterbury Center expects to receive \$50,000 from the Benevolent Fund. These difficult financial times have required us to concentrate on funding the day-to-day operations of the Center, as opposed to building the permanent endowment fund.

Two major activities continue to dominate our fundraising endeavors, the 5K Road Race/Walk in Newington on July 24 under the chairmanship of Brother Jeff Flynn, and the Annual Walk for Dyslexia Awareness in Waterbury on Sunday, October 3 under Brother Russell Griswold's continued direction. As chairman of the Board of Governors, I urge each brother here to become active in these two important fundraisers - if not as an active runner or walker - then by gathering monetary donations in support of the effort. For the 5K Road Race, Illustrious Brothers David Sharkis and Howard Turner have agreed to participate in a head-to-head contest with the loser to donate a minimum of \$5,000 to the Learning Center. Both Brothers will gratefully accept and forward to the Learning Center any donations made on their behalf. REPORT OF THE DIRECTOR 32° MASONIC LEARNING CENTER FOR CHILDREN VALLEY OF WATERBURY

To the Illustrious Commander in Chief, officers, and brethren of the Connecticut Council of Deliberations, in session at Niantic, Connecticut on June 11, 2010:

Good afternoon and greetings from all of us at the Valley of Waterbury 32° Masonic Learning Center for Children. I am Cheryl Sharkis, the Director, Tutor Trainer, as well as a tutor at the Learning Center.

We are proud to report to you that the Learning Center continues to develop and progress forward. We have celebrated the achievements of 68 youngsters. Upon completion of their work at the Center, all have progressed at least 2 to 3 grade levels in their reading skills, with many surpassing this average. At present, we have experienced ten Celebration of Achievement Ceremonies. The most recent ceremony was celebrated on Saturday, May 15. This was our largest exiting group thus far; 13 youngsters celebrated their achievements. Included in this year's celebration program was a presentation of personal inspirational experiences of successful developer Robert D. Scinto. Achievers Eddie, Tim, and Josh excitedly report that they have recently made the honor roll, while peer Michael is heading for Cheshire Academy. Alumni continue to periodically stop by to share their achievements and upcoming plans. Josh is continuing his studies at Baron Institute, Matt is continuing his work at Norwich University, and Elena is continuing her studies at a Virginia Community College. Cody has been accepted to all six colleges he has applied to; Mom and Dad are hoping he attends LaSalle, while Cody is favoring Niagara University. Devon has been inducted into the National Honor Society and will be attending Post University and Alberto will be attending Iona. The philanthropic focus of Scottish Rite Masonry is granting these young men and women an opportunity to closer meet their educational and career potential.

The Learning Center staff currently includes six initial level tutors with four additional scholars submitting paperwork for certification at the end of this July. In efforts to perpetuate the availability of advanced level tutor training, Center Directors may be encouraged to participate in Advanced Level Trainer Training. Of course this Center Director will do whatever is necessary to maintain the high quality of the CT Learning Center; however, the mere thought of attending more classes evokes the shrieking of "Good Grief Charlie Brown!" Our next initial level tutor training cycle is scheduled to begin September 24. We are always on the lookout for a few good tutor scholars, so if you or someone you know is interested please contact the Learning Center.

The Learning Center is currently providing tutorial sessions to 22 youngsters. We anticipate the enrollment to increase to approximately 26 in October. Once again, we are in the process of finalizing each youngster's progress assessment and we are thrilled to report that everyone is progressing and developing, with the gap between their grade levels and performance levels reducing significantly. There are currently 12 youngsters remaining on the waitlist. If you know of a child that may benefit from participating in the Learning Center program, please encourage their families to contact the Learning Center.

We are all thrilled and excited to be participating in such a positive and empowering youth program. Enabling these youngsters to better achieve their academic potential is spectacularly rewarding and uplifting for all involved. Individual generosity and all the continued support from the supporting Masonic bodies perpetuate the rewards. Thanks to the Scottish Rite philanthropic endeavors, you are enabling these youngsters to hold their heads high with pride

RULES AND REGULATIONS

for the

CONNECTICUT COUNCIL OF DELIBERATION ANCIENT ACCEPTED SCOTTISH RITE OF FREEMASONARY

ARTICLE I

Title and Allegiance

- Sec. 1 This Council shall be known as "Connecticut Council of Deliberation of the Ancient Accepted Scottish Rite of Freemasonry".
- Sec. 2 It is formed under and hereby acknowledges and yields allegiance to the Supreme Council of Sovereign Grand Inspectors General of the Thirty-third and last degree of the Ancient Accepted Scottish Rite of Freemasory for the Northern Masonic Jurisdiction of the United States of America, having its Grand East in the City of Lexington, Massachusetts.

ARTICLE II

Meetings, Notices, Quorum

- Sec. 1 The Connecticut Council of Deliberation shall meet annually. The time and place of each Annual Meeting shall be determined by the Council, provided, however, that such time and place of meeting may be changed by the Deputy for any reason deemed by him to require such action.
- Sec. 2 A special meeting of this Council may be called by the Deputy for such time and place within this state as he shall determine, or by this Council at any annual meeting.
- Sec. 3 Written or printed notice of each annual or special meeting of this Council shall be given by the Secretary, to be served either personally or by mail, to each member at least ten (10) days before said meeting. Such notice shall state the purpose thereof.
- Sec. 4 Accredited representatives of a majority of the Scottish Rite Bodies in this state shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

ARTICLE III

Members, Officers

- Sec. 1 The members of this Council of Deliberation shall be such as are prescribed by the Supreme Council.
- Sec. 2a The Council shall elect the following officers at each annual meeting to hold office for one year or until their successors shall be elected and installed:

First Lieutenant Commander

Second Lieutenant Commander

Minister of State

Chancellor

Prior

Treasurer

Secretary

Master of Ceremonies

Hospitaler Seneschal Standard Bearer Guard Sentinel

- Sec. 2b The Commander in Chief shall appoint a member of this Council of Deliberation as Grand Historian who shall keep a record of all events of historical significance and report thereon to this Council annually.
- Sec. 3 In case of vacancy in any office, by death, removal from the jurisdiction or otherwise, or failure to elect officers in this Council, the Illustrious Commander in Chief may make appointments to be in force until the next annual meeting.
- Sec. 4 Each officer of this Council shall perform the duties customarily incident to his office in accordance with Masonic usage and shall perform such other duties as may be assigned to him by resolution of this Council or by the Illustrious Commander in Chief.
- Sec. 5 The officers shall be installed at the annual meeting or as soon thereafter as practicable.
- Sec. 6 Scottish Rite Bodies in this State may elect members of the Rite in good standing in the Northern Jurisdiction as Honorary Members under such rules and regulations as their By-Laws may prescribe; provided, however, that no member of a Valley may be elected an Honorary member of the Valley in which he is a member.
- Sec. 7 Semi-public installation of the officers of Scottish Rite Bodies in this State is permitted.
- Sec. 8 A personal contact shall be made with each resident Connecticut member of the Scottish Rite before he can be suspended or dropped from membership for non-payment of dues and assessments. The Thrice Potent Master of each Valley shall be responsible for the personal contact in his Valley, and a report shall be made available to the Secretary of the Valley. The Secretary shall retain the report for future reference and the records.
- Sec. 9a This Council of Deliberation authorizes the holding of dual memberships for members of the Scottish Rite in the Northern Masonic Jurisdiction.
- Sec. 9b A member of the Rite holding membership in a Valley outside of this State may apply for dual membership in a Valley in this state provided dual membership is permitted in the state of his membership, or a waiver of jurisdiction is obtained.
- Sec. 9c A dual member shall be required to pay the customary dues of the bodies which he joins, but no fee becoming a dual member shall be charged.

ARTICLE IV

Standing Committees

Sec. 1 - At the close of each annual meeting, the Illustrious Commander in Chief, or in his absence the presiding officer, shall appoint the following Standing Committees to continue in office until a new committee be appointed:

Committee on Business
Committee on Credentials
Committee on Dispensations and Charters

Committee on Finance
Committee on Meritorious Service Award
Committee on Necrology
Committee on Next Place of Meeting
Committee on Nominations
Committee on Rules and Regulations
Committee on State of the Rite
Committee on Insurance

- Sec. 2 The Committee on Business shall review the address of the Illustrious Commander in Chief and shall make recommendations regarding the apportionment and disposition of the several parts of the address.
- Sec. 3 The Committee on Credentials shall pass on the qualifications of every person presenting himself for attendance at each annual or special meeting of this Council and to report thereon at such meeting.
- Sec. 4 The Committee on Dispensations and Charters shall investigate every application for a dispensation or charter and make a written recommendations thereon to this Council.
- Sec. 5 The Committee on Finance shall audit the books and accounts of the Secretary, Treasurer, and Hospitaler and make a written report thereon at the annual meeting of this Council. It shall prepare and present a budget of estimated receipts and expenditures for the ensuing year.
- Sec. 6 The Committee on Meritorious Service Award shall consist of five members of the Supreme Council, one from each of the five Valleys in the state. It shall be the duty of this committee to receive and consider the nominations from the various Valleys and to make recommendations to this Council, at each annual meeting thereof, of members of the Rite in this state to receive the Meritorious Service Award.
- Sec. 7 The Committee on Necrology shall report at each meeting of this Council the names, degrees, titles, and date of death, of all members of the Supreme Council in this state dying during the preceding year, together with similar data on such other outstanding Masonic leaders as it may deem proper.
- Sec. 8 The Committee on Next Place of Meeting shall recommend at each annual meeting of this Council a place for subsequent annual meeting or meetings of this Council.
- Sec. 9 The Committee on Nominations shall consist of the members of the Supreme Council accredited to this state. It shall be the duty of such Committee to nominate candidate for election to the offices of this Council at each meeting place.
- Sec. 10 The Committee on Rules and Regulations shall consider all matters pertaining to the laws, rules, regulations, and jurisprudence referred to it by the Deputy or by this Council and shall make recommendations thereon.
- Sec. 11 The Committee on State of the Rite shall consider throughout the year all matters pertaining to the State of the Rite in this state, make recommendations to the Deputy from time to time, and it shall make a written report to this Council at each annual meeting.
- Sec. 12 The Committee on Insurance shall consist of three members who shall administer all insurance and related matters pertaining to the Scottish Rite Bodies in the state of Connecticut.

ARTICLE V

Finances

- Sec. I The Secretary of each body of the Rite in this state shall, annually, at least seven days prior to the annual meeting forward to the Secretary of the Council of Deliberation a detailed statement of the proceeding year's work and a remittance of the per capita tax of one dollar (\$1.00) (as amended 8/15/2007) per each member on it roll of membership as of May 31.
- Sec. 2 This Council at any annual or special meeting may vote assessments on the Bodies of the Rite in this state as this Council shall deem proper, provided, however, that every such additional assessment shall be designated for some particular purpose and shall be used only for that purpose.
- Sec. 3 The fiscal year of this Council shall begin on the first day of August in each year and shall end on the 31st day of July in the next succeeding year.
- Sec. 4 No money shall be drawn on the Treasurer except upon a warrant signed by the Secretary, countersigned by the Illustrious Commander in Chief, and issued in payment of an appropriation or in accordance with an order previously made by this Council.
- Sec. 5 The Secretary, Treasurer, and Hospitaler of this Council of Deliberation shall be bonded in such manner and in such amount as shall be determined by resolution of the Council, or in default of such determination then determined by the Deputy, the premium on such bonds to be paid by this Council.

ARTICLE VI

Jurisdiction of Valleys

Sec. 1 - Each Valley in this state shall have concurrent jurisdiction within the State of Connecticut.

ARTICLE VII

Meritorious Service Award

- Sec. 1a An award to be known as the "Illustrious Arthur M. Brown, 33°, Meritorious Service Award" is hereby established for the State of Connecticut. It shall be conferred upon Scottish Rite Masons who, by reason of meritorious services of a Masonic character, are worthy and should be so cited.
- Sec. 1b The award shall consist of a jewel in memory of the late Deputy for this state, Ill. Arthur M. Brown, 33°.
- Sec. 1c The recipients must have received the grade of Sublime Prince of the Royal Secret.
- Sec. 1d -The award shall be limited to one member for each 1000 members per Valley, with no Valley entitled to less than one each year provided the Valley is in good standing. (N.B. Constitutional limitation not to exceed one per body in each Valley.) (Art. 901-d).
- Sec. 2 The following procedure shall be followed by this Council relative to selecting those who are to receive such awards and in presenting the awards to those selected.
- Sec. 2a The presiding officers of the Bodies of the Rite in the state shall present recommendations in writing to the Council of Deliberation, nominating the

member or members of their bodies whom they feel should receive the award. No presiding officer is eligible to receive this award while he is involved in the nominating process.

- Sec. 2b Such nominations shall be referred to the Standing Committee on Meritorious Service Award at least one month prior to the annual meeting of this Council, except that by unanimous consent of this Council nominations may be referred to the Committee at the annual meeting for consideration at that annual meeting.
- Sec. 2c -The Committee on Meritorious Service Award shall consider the nominations referred to it from the various Valleys and shall make recommendations to this Council, at each annual meeting thereof, of members of the Rite in this State to receive the Meritorious Service Award.
- Sec. 3 The presentation of the award and insignia shall be made by the Deputy, or someone selected by him. Such presentation shall be made either in the Valley in which the recipient is a member or at a meeting of the Council of Deliberation, as the Deputy may determine.
- Sec. 4 The jewel shall consist of an ornamented gold bar, one and a half inches long, with the words "Connecticut Council of Deliberation" in gold letters set in red enamel. A second gold bar, one and a quarter inches long, is suspended from the first bar by five gold links. On this bar shall be the words "Ill. Arthur M. Brown, 33°, Meritorious Service Award" in gold letters set in red enamel. A double headed eagle, emblem of the Thirty-Second Degree, is suspended from this second bar by three gold links. The figures "32" are of gold set in a triangle of black enamel. The height of the jewel shall be two and three-quarters inches.

ARTICLE VIII

Amendments

- Sec. 1 By Amendment of Supreme Council Constitutions, etc. Upon amendment of the constitutions and regulations of the Supreme Council of Sovereign Grand Inspectors General of the Thirty-third and last degree of the Ancient Accepted Scottish Rite of Freemasonry for the Northern Masonic Jurisdiction of the United States of America, or upon the promulgation or any decree of said Supreme Council, inconsistent with any provision of these Rules and Regulations, then in every such event, and without any further act or deed whatsoever, these Rules and Regulations shall be deemed to be and shall be automatically amended in conformity therewith.
- Sec. 2 By Council of Deliberation, these Rules and Regulations may be amended at any annual meeting of this Council by a majority vote of the members present, provided the proposed amendment or amendments have been presented at the proceeding annual meeting, and due notice thereof shall have been given to the members and provided, further, that an amendment or amendments may be adopted at the annual meeting at which it is presented, by a two-thirds vote of the members present, thirty (30) days notice of the proposed amendment or amendments having been given to the members.
- Sec. 3 All By-Laws, Rules and Regulations previously adopted by this Council are hereby rescinded.
